A Prisma-delic Frame

he saying goes, "If you remember the 60s, you really weren't there." Although I was only 10 years old, Day-Glo black light posters were the art statement of my generation, at least in terms of plastering the walls of my teenage bedroom. Apparently, I still carry a flame for psychedelia and fluorescent paint; when I saw the carved and painted design concepts of Prisma frames, I knew they were the ticket.

The Evolution of a Frame Design

But first, a little history. In 1983, I apprenticed as a framer for one week learning the basics of joining, matting, and fitting. The rest of my education was due in large part to articles in *Picture Framing Magazine*, where master framers shared their knowledge.

One of those articles featured a combed paint "faux peacock" finish. This finish is done in three layers, a base coat with any color you wish to show through; next, a clear coat to seal the first layer and this allows for a wash-off of and a top coat, if necessary. The top coat is usually a thick black paint dragged with a "comb" to remove the black and expose the undercoat in a wavy or geometric pattern.

We first used this in our shop on zebra prints. Then we introduced "crayons" similar to coloring a page with random colors and then covering it with black crayon. Scratching a design or drawing through the black allowed the random colors to be revealed. Those frames evolved to what we termed "wavy gravy" to show the spectrum of the rainbow as color goes from ultra violet to infrared. These were used on Peter Max and Grateful Dead posters.

With a general sense of what the frame would look like, I started looking for the right psychedelic poster. In the business of custom framing, we are

almost always presented with the art first and asked to make the appropriate frame. I like to take advantage of being able to source both the art and the frame when possible, as the whole package is often greater than the sum of its parts. After searching through scores of concert posters, I came across a print of the Vulcan Gas Company poster advertising Shiva's Headband from April 12th and 13th, 1968. The image was designed by American cartoonist Gilbert Shelton, who also designed the cover art for The Grateful Dead's 1978 album, Shakedown Street. This type of design requires a bit of deciphering even without an altered consciousness, but its main element was the prismatic gradations from yellow to orange to pink and the complementary background gradation of turquoise to green.

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I chose a 3" wide Prisma Nouveau panel frame with a radiant cascade pattern. The Nouveau frame has rounded corners and is slightly concave along the sides, which echoes the psychedelic theme of the art. The frame is made of ³/₄" clear acrylic, polished and ready to paint. Only the face was covered with paper mask, so any area not being painted had to be masked. The design of the frame has thin, wavy stripes of the cascade pattern shade from yellow-green to blue-purple while the field color of the poster transitioned from purple-hot pink to red-orange to yellow-green. I tried to make the background color match, making it complementary to the color in the typeface design. First, the pattern was painted, followed by the field. The

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The art was dry mounted and fit with UltraVue Museum Glass, which blocks UV rays and provides better light transmission of the bright colors. The frame proved to be the perfect accent to any psychedelic art piece, a tribute to the colorful, trippy times of the 60s. **PFM**
